RESOLUTION NO. 1-7/25/06

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE  
SAN DIEGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT  
ORDERING AN ELECTION, AND ESTABLISHING  
SPECIFICATIONS OF THE ELECTION ORDER

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees (the "Board") has determined that certain properties, facilities and equipment within the San Diego Community College District (the "District") need to be acquired, constructed, improved, maintained and equipped to enable City College, Mesa College, Miramar College and the six Continuing Education Campuses to provide affordable, local higher education, train local residents for higher-paying and skilled jobs, and to enhance the educational opportunities of the students in the District who desire to transfer to a four-year college; and

WHEREAS, the Board, after completing a District-wide comprehensive facilities needs assessment, has determined that the addition of new classrooms, job training facilities, computer science, technology, and instructional laboratories, the upgrade of classrooms and lecture halls, the improvement of electrical, lighting, and ventilation systems in existing classrooms, and the continued improvement of campus safety are among the highest priorities of the Board; and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding ongoing efforts to obtain sufficient facility money from the State of California (the "State"), the State has been unable to provide the District with enough money for the District to adequately maintain and enhance its three colleges and six Continuing Education campuses for students; and

WHEREAS, after much consideration, discussion and public input, in the judgment of the Board, it is advisable to provide additional facility funding for such facility, technology, and safety needs by means of a general obligation bond; and

WHEREAS, Proposition 46, approved by the voters of the State of California on June 3, 1986 ("Proposition 46"), amended Section 1(b) of Article XIII A of the California Constitution by adding a provision which exempts from the 1% of full cash value limitation, those ad valorem taxes used to pay for debt service of any bonded indebtedness for the acquisition or improvement of real property approved on or after July 1, 1978, by two-thirds of the votes cast by voters voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, on November 7, 2000, the voters of California approved the Smaller Classes, Safer Schools and Financial Accountability Act ("Proposition 39") which, as of its effective date, reduced the voter threshold for *ad valorem* tax levies used to pay for debt service on bonded indebtedness to 55% of the votes cast on a community college district general obligation bond; and

WHEREAS, concurrent with the passage of Proposition 39, Chapter 1.5, Part 10, Division 1, Title 1 (commencing with Section 15264) of the Education Code (the "Act") became operative and established requirements associated with the implementation of Proposition 39; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to make certain findings herein to be applicable to this election order and to establish certain performance audits, standards of financial accountability and citizen oversight which are contained in Proposition 39 and the Act and this resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to establish the importance of identifying funding sources for the ongoing maintenance costs of projects constructed with the proceeds of a general obligation bond; and

WHEREAS, the Board further desires to establish procedures to ensure that all projects funded by the proceeds of a general obligation bond shall be undertaken by contractors who are qualified to bid on the work and complete such projects; and

WHEREAS, the Board further determines to establish and enforce a labor compliance program for projects funded by the proceeds of a general obligation bond which includes requirements relating to the payment of prevailing wages and compliance with all applicable state and federal labor and public contract laws; and

WHEREAS, the Board determines that the restrictions in Proposition 39, as interpreted by the Attorney General of the State of California, which prohibit any bond money to be used for teacher or administrator salaries and expenses, be strictly enforced by a citizens' oversight committee; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the California Elections Code, it is appropriate for the Board to request consolidation of the election with any and all other elections to be held on November 7, 2006, and to request the San Diego County Registrar of Voters to perform certain election services for the District; and

WHEREAS, in the judgment of the Board, it is advisable to request the San Diego County Registrar of Voters to call an election pursuant to Proposition 39 on the question of whether general obligation bonds shall be issued and sold on behalf of the District for purposes set forth below; and

WHEREAS, after the adoption of this Resolution, the District will limit its expenditures of public funds in connection with this measure to certain "educational efforts"; and

NOW THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF THE SAN DIEGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Board, pursuant to Education Code Sections 15100 and Government Code Section 53506, hereby requests the San Diego County Registrar of Voters to call an election under the provisions of Proposition 39 and the Act and submit to the electors of the District the question of whether bonds of the District in the aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$870 million (the "Bonds") shall be issued and sold to raise money for the purposes described in Exhibits "A" and "B" hereto.

Section 2. That the date of the election shall be November 7, 2006.

Section 3. That the purpose of the election shall be for the voters in the District to vote on a proposition, a copy of which is attached hereto and marked Exhibit "A" and incorporated by reference herein, containing the question of whether the District shall issue the Bonds to pay for improvements to the extent permitted by such proposition. In compliance with Proposition 39 and the Act, the ballot proposition in Exhibits "A" and "B", is subject to the following requirements and determinations:

(a) that proceeds of the sale of the Bonds shall only be used for the purposes set forth in the ballot measure and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries and other operating expenses;

(b) that the Board, in establishing the projects set forth in Exhibit "B", evaluated the safety, class size and offerings, and information technology needs of the District;

(c) that the Board will cause to be conducted an annual, independent, performance audit to ensure that the Bond moneys get expended for the projects identified in Exhibit "B" hereto;

(d) that the Board will cause an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of Bonds to be conducted until all of the Bond proceeds have been expended;

(e) that the Board will cause the appointment of a Citizens' Oversight Committee in compliance with Education Code Section 15278 no later than 60 days after the Board enters the election results in its minutes pursuant to Education Code Section 15274, with the committee to include construction, finance and other qualified persons. The Citizens' Oversight Committee shall initially consist of at least seven (7) members and at no time consist of less than seven (7) members, with the possible exception of brief periods to fill any unexpected vacancies. The Citizens' Oversight Committee may not include any employee or official of the District or any vendor, contractor or consultant of the District. The Citizens' Oversight Committee shall include all of the following: One (1) member who is active in a business organization representing the business community located within the District; One (1) member who is active in a senior citizens' organization; One member who is active in a bona fide taxpayer association. In furtherance of its specifically enumerated purposes, the Citizens' Oversight Committee may engage in any of the following activities relating solely and exclusively to the expenditure of the Proposition 39 bond proceeds:

(i) Receive and review copies of the annual, independent financial and performance audits performed by independent consultant(s);

(ii) Inspect District facilities and grounds to ensure that Proposition 39 bond revenues are expended in compliance with applicable law;

(iii) Receive and review copies of all deferred maintenance proposals or plans developed by the District;

(iv) Review efforts of the District to maximize Proposition 39 bond revenues by implementing cost-saving programs;

(f) that the tax levy authorized to secure the bonds of this election shall not exceed \$25 per \$100,000 of taxable property in the District when assessed valuation is projected by the District to increase in accordance with Article XIII A of the California Constitution;

(g) that prior to the issuance of bonds for the construction of new projects set forth in Exhibit "B", that Board would have received and approved a report from the Chancellor, stating that the District had identified sufficient financial resources to pay for the ongoing maintenance of such projects, and that such a report shall be made available to the Citizens' Oversight Committee for review;

(h) that the District must have a Board of Trustees approved short-term plan to eliminate deferred maintenance using general fund revenues, and, if necessary, with a limited reliance on bond revenues; and an approved major maintenance plan to ensure that both new and renovated facilities do not become maintenance deferred once the backlog has been eliminated. The plan should be made available to the Citizens' Oversight Committee;

(i) that in order to maximize community benefit and efficiently apply taxpayer dollars, the District should pursue all practical opportunities to expand community joint-use facilities in every new or expanded school construction project. In pursuing joint-use, the District's goal should be to maximize the use of District facilities to the broader community, without adversely impacting district operations or finances. Examples of appropriate joint-use provisions for incorporation into construction plans include, but are not limited to, new and expanded library facilities, recreational/physical education facilities, computer labs, meeting rooms and childcare and health care facilities. Appropriate joint-use should take

into consideration that the colleges and Continuing Education campuses have many facilities that operate and offer classes from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m., with the evening programs serving about the same number of students as the day programs.

- (j) that a majority of the members of the Citizens' Oversight Committee shall possess skills and/or experience in one or more of the following areas:
  - (i) large scale construction operations;
  - (ii) municipal/public finance matters;
  - (iii) multiple years experience with agency/entity budgeting (which may include public agency or public entity budgeting);
  - (iv) project management, and/or
  - (v) other qualified professionals.

The Board of Trustees shall direct staff to implement the following procedures:

- Prior to the obligation of funds for new facilities or facilities expansion construction that likely would be appropriate for joint-use, a joint use implementation report shall be presented in writing to the Citizens' Oversight Committee and approved by the Board of Trustees.
- The joint-use implementation report shall include the following minimum information:
  - Project description
  - List and description of joint-use elements that could potentially be incorporated into the project
  - List of agencies and organizations contacted regarding potential joint-use elements, including description of how agencies and organizations were contacted
  - For each agency or organization contacted:
    - Joint-use development criteria discussed or developed for the project
    - Equity of contribution considerations discussed or developed for the project

In addition, it is the intention of the Board of Trustees to make official, policy level contacts with overlapping public jurisdictions, in order to make joint-use and the efficient application of taxpayers dollars a priority of all agencies serving district boundaries. Agencies contacted should include, but not be limited to City of San Diego, County of San Diego, public school district, and transit agencies;

(k) that prior to the issuance of the bonds, the District shall apply and continue to enforce a prequalification of bidders procedure on all new projects set forth in Exhibit "B" so that the District can be confident that all contractors, at all times, are qualified to bid on, work on, and complete such projects; and

(l) that prior to the issuance of the bonds, the District shall initiate and enforce a labor compliance program which requires that (i) all contracts contain appropriate language concerning public works; (ii) federal and state labor laws are fully disclosed to all bidders; (iii) weekly payroll records of each contractor and subcontractor be available for District review; (iv) all contractors and subcontractors comply with applicable prevailing wage laws; (v) the District may withhold contract payments if any of the other requirements have not been satisfied. Data on outreach efforts and results to attract bidders to District projects shall be reported periodically to the Citizens' Oversight Committee. The information to

the Citizens' Oversight Committee shall include statistical data, such as total number of bidders per project, but shall not include confidential information about specific bids.

Section 4. That the authority for ordering the election is contained in Education Code Sections 15100 *et seq.* and 15264 *et seq.* and Government Code Section 53506.

Section 5. That the authority for the specifications of this election order is contained in Section 5322 of the Education Code.

Section 6. That the San Diego County Registrar of Voters and the San Diego County Board of Supervisors are hereby requested to consolidate the election ordered hereby with any and all other elections to be held on November 7, 2006 within the District.

Section 7. That this Resolution shall stand as the "order of election" to the San Diego County Registrar of Voters to call an election within the boundaries of the District on November 7, 2006.

Section 8. That the Secretary of the Board is hereby directed to send a certified copy of this Resolution to the San Diego County Registrar of Voters no later than August 9, 2006.

Section 9. That the maturity of any Bonds issued pursuant to Section 15100 *et seq.* of the Education Code, and Bonds issued pursuant to Section 53506 of the Government Code shall not exceed the maturity limits set forth therein, respectively. The maximum interest rate on any Bond shall not exceed the maximum rate allowed by Education Code Sections 15140 to 15143, as modified by Government Code Section 53531.

Section 10. That the Board requests the governing body of any such other political subdivision, or any officer otherwise authorized by law, to partially or completely consolidate such election and to further provide that the canvass be made by any body or official authorized by law to canvass the returns of the election, and that the Board consents to such consolidation.

Section 11. Pursuant to Section 5303 of the Education Code and Section 10002 of the Elections Code, the Board of Supervisors of San Diego County is requested to permit the Registrar of Voters to render all services specified by Section 10418 of the Elections Code relating to the election, for which services the District agrees to reimburse San Diego County, such services to include the publication of a Formal Notice of School Bond Election and the mailing of the sample ballot and tax rate statement (described in Section 9401 of the Elections Code) pursuant to the terms of Section 5363 of the Education Code and Section 12112 of the Elections Code.

EXHIBIT B  
FULL TEXT BALLOT PROPOSITION  
OF THE SAN DIEGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT  
BOND MEASURE ELECTION NOVEMBER 7, 2006

The following is the full proposition presented to the voters by the San Diego Community College District.

"Community Colleges Classroom Construction, Repair/Safety Measure. To better prepare San Diego community college students for 4-year universities and quality jobs, shall San Diego Community College District upgrade existing educational facilities, including renovating classrooms for nursing, police, paramedic, and firefighting careers, upgrade science and high-tech training labs; repair aging roofs, electrical and safety systems; and construct and equip facilities and sites; by issuing \$870 million in bonds, at legal rates, with citizen oversight, mandatory audits, no money for administrative salaries, and maintain current tax rate limits?"

**PROJECTS**

The Board of Trustees of the San Diego Community College District, to be responsive to the needs of students and the community, evaluated the District's urgent and critical facility needs, including providing sufficient classrooms and labs to offer more courses and programs to students close to home, facility maintenance, safety issues, class size and offerings, energy cost reduction and information and computer technology, as outlined in the Master Facilities Needs List, incorporated herein in its entirety and as amended from time to time. In developing the scope of projects, the faculty, staff and students have prioritized the key health and safety needs so that the most critical needs and the most urgent and basic facility needs and repairs that will make each of City College, Mesa College and Miramar College clean and safe for learning and its Continuing Education Campuses viable, are addressed. The Board conducted facilities evaluations and received public input and review in developing the scope of college facility projects to be funded, as listed in the Master Plan Facilities Needs List. The Chancellor received input of faculty, business, industry, and workforce development partners, and concluded that if these needs were not addressed now, the facility problems will only get worse.

**In implementing the Master Plan Facilities Needs List, the Board of Trustees determines that San Diego Community College District must:**

- **Due to the high costs of attending public and private universities, City College, Mesa College and Miramar College must provide a high-quality, affordable education to local students who might otherwise be denied the opportunity to receive job training or a college education.**
- **City College, Mesa College and Miramar College must provide a positive alternative for students who want to work and go to school, seek vocational training or for workers who need to learn new job skills later in life.**
- **Expand classrooms and labs that provide immediate job training for critical professions such as Public Safety programs, Firefighting and Police training.**

- **Renovate existing classrooms, science labs and vocational training facilities to ensure that they are safe, energy efficient and provide access to state-of-the-art computers and instructional technology.**
- **Provide safe classroom facilities throughout the areas served by City College, Mesa College and Miramar College and Continuing Education to allow adult learners to receive job training and to enable more local students to transfer to four-year universities.**

The Master Facilities Needs List is on file and available for review at the District Chancellor's Office and includes the type of projects listed below.

### **SAN DIEGO CITY COLLEGE**

The specific facilities projects at San Diego City College include:

**PROJECT I: Construct and equip classrooms and labs, academic instructional, and support areas for a Science Building, Engineering Technology Building, and Business Technology Building.**

- (1) Construct 45,000 ASF Science Building providing academic classrooms/labs and associated prep areas.
- (2) Demolish 60-year-old "T" Building and construct 40,000 ASF Engineering Technology Building with emphasis on engineering disciplines. Project will provide general-purpose classrooms and labs to address curriculum in the six major areas of Telecommunications, Software Development, Electronics, Biotechnology, Environmental Studies, and Space and Defense.
- (3) Construct 40,000 ASF Business Technology Building with emphasis on high-tech labs.

**PROJECT II: Construct and equip academic classrooms and labs, academic instructional and support areas for a Humanities Building.**

- (1) Construct 70,000 ASF Humanities Building providing academic classrooms, and multimedia and broadcast technology-equipped classrooms and labs.

**PROJECT III: Repair and renovate existing academic classrooms, labs, and student support facilities.**

- (1) Repair and renovate Instructional "A" Building to house academic classrooms, faculty offices, and student support areas.
- (2) Repair and renovate Instructional "C" Building to upgrade classrooms and labs for Languages, Speech Therapy, Visual Arts, and Workforce Training programs.

- (3) Repair, renovate, and reconfigure "M" Building to house student support services, including Counseling, Admissions, and Financial Aid.
- (4) Repair "D" Building leaking roof and renovate roof area for additional student study space.

**PROJECT IV:** For improved safety and better access, upgrade infrastructure throughout campus.

- (1) Repair, upgrade, add or improve sidewalks and pedestrian walkways, surface parking, utilities, signage, and landscaping.

### SAN DIEGO MESA COLLEGE

The specific facilities projects at San Diego Mesa College include:

**PROJECT I:** Construct academic classrooms and labs for improved instruction.

- (1) Construct 80,000 ASF Math and Science Building providing labs and lecture classrooms for Chemistry, Physical Sciences, Biology, and Mathematics.
- (2) Construct and/or renovate 60,000 ASF Instructional Technology Building including classrooms and computer labs for Multimedia, Mathematics, Business, and Architecture instructional programs.
- (3) Construct 20,000 ASF Instructional Facility to support Fine Arts and Dramatic Arts instruction.

**PROJECT II:** Upgrade 40-year-old, worn-out, outdated student support facilities.

- (1) Construct 11,000 ASF facility for instructional materials and supplies storage.
- (2) Construct and equip 65,000 ASF textbook and food service facility.

**PROJECT III:** For improved safety and better access, upgrade infrastructure throughout campus.

- (1) Repair, upgrade, add or improve sidewalks and pedestrian walkways, surface parking, utilities, signage, and landscaping.

**SAN DIEGO MIRAMAR COLLEGE**

The specific facilities projects at San Diego Miramar College include:

**PROJECT I: Build and equip classrooms, labs, and academic instructional and support areas for San Diego Regional Public Safety Institute.**

- (1) Repair, renovate, and upgrade the region's training center for public safety (Police Officers, Deputy Sheriffs, Firefighters, Emergency Medical Technicians, and Lifeguards). The San Diego Community College District (SDCCD) is an equal partner in the joint powers authority formed by the City, the County, and the SDCCD.
- (2) Acquire property and relocate San Diego Regional Public Safety Institute's instructional Police and Fire Vehicle Driving Range to enable the Police and Fire Academies to train cadets regarding driving procedures.

**PROJECT II: Repair, renovate, and expand existing Science Building for improved instruction.**

- (1) Repair and renovate Science Building to convert existing classrooms into additional lab space; construct an enclosure on the west side of the building for faculty offices and related academic support rooms of 15,000 ASF and an instructional outdoor area, including greenhouses and biological pond.

**PROJECT III: Build and equip classrooms, labs, and academic instructional and support areas for Workforce Training instruction.**

- (1) Repair and renovate existing 15,300 ASF of Aviation Maintenance Technology Center, retrofit classrooms and design/construct new classrooms to accommodate new technologies key to preparing Aviation Technicians, and renovate Aviation Technology lab spaces.
- (2) Construct 14,000 ASF Heavy Duty Advanced Transportation Technology Center to support program expansion to Diesel, Natural Gas, Hybrid Bus and Transit Technology, and new developments in Construction Equipment Technology.
- (3) Construct 6,500 ASF expansion of Automotive Technology Career Instructional Building to include automotive bays and support the Automotive Technology Department's curriculum.

**PROJECT IV: Upgrade and construct new student support facilities.**

- (1) Repair, renovate, and convert 9,300 ASF C-400 Building to house student support services, including Admissions, Counseling, Disabled Students Programs and Services, Extended Opportunity Programs and Services, Assessment Services, Evaluations, and Accounting.

- (2) Construct 45,000 ASF Student/Campus Center including textbook and food service facility.
- (3) Build and equip 8,000 ASF Police/Emergency Services Substation and College Services Center.
- (4) Construct 6,000 ASF maintenance facility for tool and equipment storage and required maintenance staff.
- (5) Improve safety and relieve traffic congestion by constructing Parking Structure #1.
- (6) To improve safety, remove 10 outdated, worn-out bungalows, add safe sidewalks and roads throughout the campus, create and complete a northern entrance in the proximity of Westview Parkway, and complete a safe pedestrian walkway from Black Mountain Road.

**PROJECT V:** For improved safety and better access, upgrade infrastructure throughout campus.

- (1) Repair, upgrade, add or improve sidewalks and pedestrian walkways, surface parking, utilities, signage, and landscaping.

### **SAN DIEGO CONTINUING EDUCATION**

The facilities for adult education programs at San Diego Continuing Education include short-term job training, high school completion, health care professions, office skills training, and programs for disabled students. The specific projects for San Diego Continuing Education include:

**PROJECT I:** Construct Clairemont/Linda Vista Adult Education Building for occupational and instructional programs that lead to entry-level employment.

- (1) Acquire land and construct new 25,000 ASF building providing sufficient classrooms and academic support areas.

**PROJECT II:** Expand Educational Cultural Complex:

- (1) Construct 15,000 ASF Phase IIB wing as an addition to main building and renovate and relocate program offices. Programs accommodated in the new building will include workforce training and preparation, including state of the art labs, lecture, and support space.

The list is designed to describe the many repairs, renovations and improvements now critically needed for District facilities in order to complete the facilities master plans for all District campuses. The descriptions of individual buildings and facilities are expected to be refined as the District's development plans are completed. The final design of buildings and facilities may vary from these descriptions. As projects are more fully developed, specific designs may be refined by

the District's development review team—drawn from the Colleges and Continuing Education. Final designs will conform to all applicable code requirements. Where applicable, the suggested sizes of buildings are indicated in Assignable Square Feet (ASF).

Listed building, repair and rehabilitation projects and upgrades will be completed as needed. Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, equipment, architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, program management, staff training expenses and a customary contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs. The allocation of bond proceeds will be affected by the District's receipt of State bond funds and the final costs of each project. The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans are finalized, construction bids are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Demolition of existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for modernization may be required, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating more enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. There will be necessary site preparation/restoration in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing irrigation, utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, or rights of way to the property.

**FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY. THE EXPENDITURE OF BOND MONEY ON THESE PROJECTS IS SUBJECT TO STRINGENT FINANCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS. BY LAW, PERFORMANCE AND FINANCIAL AUDITS WILL BE PERFORMED ANNUALLY, AND ALL BOND EXPENDITURES WILL BE MONITORED BY AN INDEPENDENT CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE TO ENSURE THAT FUNDS ARE SPENT AS PROMISED AND AS SPECIFIED. THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE MUST INCLUDE, AMONG OTHERS, REPRESENTATION OF A BONA FIDE TAXPAYERS' ASSOCIATION, A BUSINESS ORGANIZATION AND A SENIOR CITIZENS' ORGANIZATION. NO DISTRICT EMPLOYEES OR VENDORS ARE PERMITTED TO SERVE ON THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.**

**NO ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES. PROCEEDS FROM THE SALE OF THE BONDS AUTHORIZED BY THIS PROPOSITION SHALL BE USED ONLY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION, RECONSTRUCTION, REHABILITATION, ACQUISITION OR REPLACEMENT OF COLLEGE FACILITIES, INCLUDING THE FURNISHING AND EQUIPPING OF COLLEGE FACILITIES, AND NOT FOR ANY OTHER PURPOSE, INCLUDING TEACHERS' AND ADMINISTRATORS' SALARIES AND OTHER OPERATING EXPENSES.**
